## **ANZAC DAY 2010**

All RAAF and WAAAF Veterans and serving members are invited to assemble at the usual 1030am in Elizabeth Street, City (just south of Market Street).

RAAF will march as a complete service and current RAAF units are permitted to march with WW2 and Post WW2 units. Therefore, again this year, we will be accompanied by a contingent of serving members from Surveillance and Response Group (SRG), RAAF Williamtown. SRG includes Nos 41, 42 and 44 Wings which were also active in WWII as radar units. We are extremely grateful and delighted that serving RAAF members can once again join with us on this important day.

In addition to serving members, WWII and Post WWII veterans, one relative representing a deceased or disabled veteran may march with the Radar Branch. . In particular, one descendant will be allowed to march as a 'carer' for Veterans with a genuine need. Representatives of Radar Branch veterans may wear the veteran's medals on his or her right side and are invited to march in the contingent rear rows Instructions for others who wish to participate in the march will be published by the RAAF NSW Association. Descendants who are not representing a veteran member of a Branch or association will be able to join the march in the RAAF Descendants section at the rear of the Air Force contingent.

## **PAST EVENTS**

### **Annual Christmas Luncheon 2009**

The Radar Branch held its annual Christmas Luncheon at the The City Tattersalls Club. on 4 December 2009. The event was attended by only 30 members including the company of serving RAAF members. As mentioned last year, the annual luncheon will become increasingly difficult without branch member support and attendance. Whilst City Tattersalls is an ideal function locality because of its central locality and access to transport and parking an alternative venue and luncheon arrangement may have to be considered for this year. Members input would be greatly appreciated in this regard.

The toast to RAAF was made by Patron AVM Bob Treloar, AO and responded to by Officer Commanding 41 Wing, Daryl Hunter who has recently completed a tour of duty with No 41 Wing Radar Detachment in Kandahar, Afghanistan. Again, our thanks go to Surveillance and Response Group from RAAF Williamtown for their continued support.

The Christmas lunch is a traditional function for the Branch and we intend to keep it going into the future in a location and format that will attract member participation and provide the means to bring members together for as special occasion. The committee is well aware that cost is an important aspect of making the function and will ensure that affordability is a key factor to encourage participation.

### **A NEW ERA FOR RADAR IN THE RAAF**

In December 2009, the first two Wedgetail Airborne Early Warning and Control (AEW&C) aircraft were delivered to No 2 Squadron at RAAF Williamtown. In all, six Wedgetails will be delivered to 2 Squadron and will herald a new era for radar in the RAAF with the introduction of cutting-edge airborne radar technology and other advanced capabilities in electronic support measures and integrated communication systems. Whilst the \$4 Billion project delivery is behind due to technical development of the advanced systems, test and evaluation has commenced to achieve full operational capability. A prominent feature of the Wedgetail is the large and powerful external 'electronically scanned array radar' on top of the fuselage which can be seen in the picture below.



When operational, No 2 Squadron and the Wedgetail AEW&C will provide an enhanced air defence, fleet support and force coordination capabilities that will play a key role in the networked- enabled Australian Defence Force. We wish No 2 Squadron all the best as they enter the last phase of their technical and flying training to bring the Wedgetail into service.

### **END OF AN ERA FOR AN OLD WAR HORSE**

On 27 November 2009, Caribou A4-140 flew into Canberra from RAAF Base Richmond on the last flight before this aircraft type ceased operations with the Royal Australian Air Force. In a small ceremony which followed, A4-140 was handed over to the Australian War Memorial. The transfer marked the end of the DHC-4 Caribou's remarkable 45-year career with the RAAF, encompassing service during the Vietnam War, several peacekeeping and peace enforcement operations, and multiple disaster relief and humanitarian missions across Australia and around the world. A total of only 29 airframes served with the RAAF, in No 35 and No 38 Squadrons, and this aircraft type holds the unique distinction of the longest record of constant operational service in the RAAF having been in service from 1964 to 2009.

The aircraft's robust construction and exceptional Short Take-Off and Landing (STOL) capability enabled it to operate from the most rudimentary of airstrips. The aircraft gave the RAAF considerable flexibility in the conduct of air mobility operations, enabling the tactical airlift of personnel and cargo across a wide variety of environments and conditions. The ability of the Caribou to sustain a high operational tempo in arduous conditions was quickly demonstrated at the very outset of the aircraft's service life.



The service of the Caribou to Australia has not just been confined to international missions. For almost half a century the Caribou's capability has been on hand to serve Australia in both military and non-military applications. The aircraft has been one of the RAAF's leading assets in response to natural disasters, search and rescue, aeromedical evacuations, and even security patrols over Bass Strait oil rigs. It has transported state police, fire fighters and visiting royalty. Throughout its entire service life, the Caribou has provided extensive support to the entire ADF, particularly airborne and tactical transport support to Army and Special Air Service training exercises.

To replace the Caribou, No 38 Squadron at RAAF Townsville will operate King Air 350 aircraft as an interim light transport in support of the ADF until a new tactical transport aircraft is identified and delivered to fill the role of the 'old warhorse'.

### **VETERANS AFFAIRS ISSUES**

The Department of Veterans' Affairs with NSW Health have introduced an initiative to provide ex military personnel with guidance on 'Advance Care Planning'. The plan is intended to assist with addressing long term health management including issues such as appointing guardians and power of attorney to manage financial decisions. ## **‘RON HUNT RECALLS’**

Once again, the Bulletin includes a recollection from Ron Hunt. Ron Hunt was an Air Defence controller between 1968 and 1972. Ron joined the RAAF in September 1968 with a four year Short Service commission as an Air Defence Officer.

### **“Military Specifications”**

We are all familiar with the term “military specifications”. When the military wants something – it has to be robust and reliable. As far as possible it must continue to function, even if damaged. After some time at 3CRU I was transferred from operations to the computer programming section – to become one of the initial team of RAAF people to take-over the maintenance of the operational software from Plessey and SCSL.. These days we are familiar with computers having Operating Systems – and running individual programs. But the HUBCAP system was different. There was the computer (a Marconi Myriad) – and there was “the system” – a huge program that fulfilled all functions. There were nominally many hundreds of program modules, and each would be assembled into a “relocatable object”. About every three months a new system would be “built” – called a “Link Edit”. It was a big job, taking the best part of a full day – and was usually done on a Sunday. It was my turn to do the Link Edit. On the Friday evening I’d got everything ready – all the object tapes and plenty of spools of paper tape and a few rolls of paper for the printer.

I arrived at the unit on the Sunday morning. The guard came over with a key and unlocked the door to the annex to the computer cabin. He opened the door and suddenly a cloud of thick white smoke poured out the door. I had no idea what, exactly, was going wrong – but it seemed obvious that it was “a bit serious”. I reached-in and threw the main power switch – and the guard and I stood back while the cloud of smoke continued pouring out of the doorway. After a couple of minutes it seemed like it might be safe enough to look inside. I checked to make quite sure there was no fire – and then rang the Engineering Officer. The engineering people arrived and I decided to leave them to it. There was no way that a Link Edit was going to happen on this Sunday! It took the engineers a long time to piece-together all the evidence and work-out exactly what had happened. The story went like this:

- ◆ There was a lot of electronic equipment in the computer cabin, and all of it generated heat. To keep the cabin cool there were several large “military specification” Westinghouse air conditioning units fastened to the walls. Each unit sat on a drip pan to collect water – and there was a small spout on the outside of the cabin for water to drain. The units were designed such that they would detect if they iced-up – and would go into a reverse-cycle to melt the ice – before returning to a cooling cycle.
- ◆ The night before one of the air conditioners did ice-up – and that caused the unit to switch to a reverse cycle to melt the ice. HOWEVER – a “friendly” bush spider had found the overflow water spout to be an ideal home – and had spun a web inside it. The water rose in the drip pan – until the water found an exit path. There was a small cable hanging down from above which touched the side of the drip pan – and then descended into a cable tray. When the water touched the cable surface tension caused the water to adhere to the cable and run down the cable into the cable tray.
- ◆ The water spread-out along the cable tray – until it found another “exit” – a hole underneath where some more cables came through. The water ran down one of these cables to the lowest point – and then dripped-down – right onto the tape run-out toggle switch on the console paper tape punch. The water caused the switch to short-circuit in the “run-out all holes punched” position – which caused an entire spool of paper tape to be punched-out.
- ◆ The punch operated at 150 characters/second and after a while the cutters became red-hot from the huge friction generated by this run-away operation. Eventually the cutters seized-up and that made the motor burn-out – which is what caused all the thick white smoke.
- ◆ Meanwhile, the water continued to drip. It formed a big pool of water on the top of the Myriad computer – and finally found its way right down into the guts of the computer. When everything was dried-out and cleaned – and then tested – it was found that so many printed circuit boards and other components had been damaged that the RAAF didn’t have enough spare parts to repair the damage. Extra parts had to be shipped out from the UK.
- ◆ The paper tape punch was damaged beyond repair – but there was one in stores.

The upshot was that the Myriad computer was off-the-air for a couple of months! So much for “military specifications”. A tiny spider had put a whole Air Defence radar system out of action for two months!
